In my own life, at least, October has often functioned as a transition month: the dog days of summer have finally ended, the leaves begin to change and fall, and the days get shorter. All the changes that the month of October brings signal that something new is right around the corner: winter.

In the same way, I hope that this October will signal a transition in our spiritual lives. We're really excited about our Fall Renewal, a brand new initiative that arose from our deacons and other leaders in the church. Much like an ol' time revival, we'll gather together on October 13 and 14 for food, special music, and preaching from Dr. Tom Stocks. But instead of focusing simply on our eternal destination, like many revivals do, Tom is going to help us discover God's call for our lives right now. It's my prayer that all of us find a renewed sense of calling and purpose at our Fall Renewal.

Tom Stocks is a phenomenal preacher. He spent the formative years of his childhood and adolescence in Zambia as a missionary child, where each week he attended church under a tree. His unique upbringing colors his ministry today. Tom has pastored churches all across Virginia, large and small. Most recently, he served as pastor at Bon Air Baptist Church. In addition, Jerry Jones will be leading worship for us. Jerry is a remarkable musician who served as a missionary with his family in Salzburg, Austria for many years.

The two Renewal worship services on October 13 and 14 at 7:00 pm have been planned to help us all hear from God in a unique way. Everyone is invited for a free, catered BBQ meal at 6:00 pm on October 13. Similarly, everyone will be encouraged to stay around for ice cream (from an ice cream truck!) after the service on October 14. Free childcare will be provided on both nights for infants - second graders. Please sign up for childcare on our website.

Because we're focusing on God's call in our lives right now, we'll also be offering service projects for the entire church to participate in throughout October. We'll be partnering with GoochlandCares to build ramps for those in our community in need. We'll be hosting a free cookout for the residents of Caritas RVA at their facility on October 21 at 10:30am. At the same time, our children will be making care packets for babies at church. We'll also have a group knitting hats for cancer patients and newborn babies on October 21. It's our hope that everyone will find a way to serve this month.

October marks a transition in my preaching, too. I'm trying something new this year: in anticipation of Christmas, I'm preaching from key Old Testament stories this fall that help give context and understanding to the life and death of Jesus.

DEACON MINUTES

Every year, as the afternoon light gets longer, I have a ritual. I pull out my scarves and boots, decorate the house with all manner of fall-themed baubles, and make a pilgrimage to the pumpkin patch. I tell myself that this yearly ritual happens because I love fall. If I'm really honest, though, I'm attempting to disguise the oncoming darkness and cold of the next few months with a dash of pumpkin spice. Perhaps it's no wonder that in a season known for its uptick in melancholy and depression, I find myself preemptively seeking out glimmers of hope. One of them happens to come from Linus and the Great Pumpkin.

In *It's the Great Pumpkin, Charlie Brown*, the Peanuts gang prepares for Halloween. While Lucy, Sally, and Charlie Brown all look forward to trick-or-treating, Linus writes a letter to the Great Pumpkin. As he explains, "On Halloween night, the Great Pumpkin rises out of the pumpkin patch and brings toys to all the good little children everywhere." Linus's belief in the Great Pumpkin draws nothing but mockery from the other children (and Snoopy), but Linus holds firm in his hope that the Great Pumpkin will come. In fact, he is so certain that he forgoes trick-or-treating in favor of sitting in the pumpkin patch so he won't miss the Great Pumpkin's arrival.

Of course, the Great Pumpkin doesn't come, and Linus is left sitting alone all night. The next day, he discusses these events with Charlie Brown. Rather than giving in to his disappointment, though, he doubles down on his belief. "Just wait 'til next year, Charlie Brown! You'll see! Next year at this same time, I'll find a pumpkin patch that is real sincere, and I'll sit in that pumpkin patch until the Great Pumpkin appears!" he cries.

If this all sounds like a metaphor for those times in life when it seems that we're desperately waiting for a miracle in the darkness, I think it is. Charles Schulz, the beloved creator of Peanuts, made no secret of his faith in God. In fact, it is common to find nods, both subtle and overt, to that faith in his work. What I appreciate most about Schulz's approach is that he doesn't shy away from the reality that sometimes life is painful and faith is hard.

Maybe that's why I watch *It's the Great Pumpkin, Charlie Brown* every October. I've always admired Linus's faith, because it remains firm in the midst of disappointment, ridicule, and darkness. Like Hebrews 11:1 tells us, "Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." Linus doesn't give up on the Great Pumpkin just because his vigil in the pumpkin patch was unsuccessful. He remains assured that he will see the Great Pumpkin one day, and neither outside circumstances nor commentary from naysayers change that conviction.

Linus's story is a reminder it's possible to hold onto hope even in the darkest night. It's a good reminder for this season, and for every season. Now, if you need me, I'll be waiting on the Great Pumpkin.

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I'm convinced that understanding the Old Testament gives us a better appreciation of Jesus Christ. I'm calling this fall sermon series "The Back Drop," because that's what many of the Old Testament stories do: they provide a back drop to help us better understand Jesus.

I hope you'll make plans to join us for our Fall Festival on Sunday, October 29, too. We'll be inviting families and children from the community to join us for dinner and a trunk or treat. If you can set up your trunk to hand out candy, please contact Kitt Townsend at kitt23.ct@gmail.com




