Waiting doesn't come naturally to us. Our preschool-aged boys remind us how difficult waiting is for them. "What, Daddy? 10 more minutes? But I don't want it to be 10 more minutes. Waiting is boring." And they're not alone. We may hide it better, but waiting for something you really want doesn't become easier as a person ages.

But the Bible would challenge my sons' notion about waiting: waiting does not have to be boring. According to the scriptures, waiting plays a vital role in our spiritual life. And that's why the church has historically observed Advent. Advent comes from the Latin word Adventus, which means, "to prepare." The season of Advent is designed to guide our waiting for the Christ, to help us prepare for his coming, and to help us prepare our hearts to receive Him. The Advent rituals we participate in. such as daily scripture reading and prayer, call us to pull back from the hustle and bustle of life and spend some time reflecting, so that we can prepare our hearts to truly receive the Christ.

We've got some of our own Advent rituals at Goochland Baptist that are designed to help you prepare your heart for Christmas. I'll be leading an Advent Bible study on Wednesdays entitled, "Sing We Now of Christmas." Each week, we'll look at a line from a popular Christmas carol and examine its biblical origins. As we do, we'll more fully appreciate the biblical themes that define Advent and Christmas.

Worship during Advent will look a little bit different, too.

We'll light the Advent candles each week and consider the great Advent themes of hope, peace, joy, and love. Community Table will also be Christmasthemed this month.

Another Advent tradition at GBC is giving back to those who need it most. Each year we give gifts to those we love, but Advent invites us to give to those who need help the most. To that end, our missions committee has put together Goochland Baptist's "Giving Map" - a map designed to help you give to those who need help most both in our community and around the world. You can read about it on page 7. I hope you'll consider giving as you're able, because there's something about giving in Christ's name that enriches both the recipient and the giver.

And there's a lot of other fun stuff happening, as well: Our children are having a Christmas party on December 9; Our youth are having one on Sunday, December 10; And of course, you won't want to miss our Christmas play coming up this Sunday, December 3. It's entitled Make Room: The Innkeeper's Story. Written by our own Jessica Stanley, it's a drama enacted by your church family designed to remind you of the meaning of Christmas. Join us for a night of laughter, song, and mystery as we celebrate Christmas together. We'll have hors d'oeuvres and a time of fellowship afterwards. Perhaps the most

In Celtic Christian spirituality, the concept of "thin spaces" refers to places or moments where the boundary between the physical world and the spiritual realm becomes more permeable. In these spaces, individuals sense a heightened connection to the divine, experiencing a closeness to God and a deeper spiritual awareness, fostering a sense of the sacred.

A family's celebration of Christmas provides a unique opportunity for experiencing a "thin space"- an opportunity for a spiritual encounter with the divine. Establishing a spiritual practice within your family's Christmas celebration can help reinforce the true essence of this festive season: the commemoration of the most precious gift, Immanuel—God with us. While numerous ideas for family spiritual practices for Christmas are available online, one simple yet meaningful practice to incorporate into your Christmas season is a Christmas Tree Blessing.

Ideally performed before the tree is decorated, gather everyone together to share a blessing for the tree. Traci Smith, in her book, Faithful Families: Creating Sacred Moments at Home, suggests the following blessing: "God who created the birds in the air, the fish in the sea, the stars in the sky, and the trees in the ground, bless this tree as we decorate it and make it a joyful symbol in our home. May its branches remind us of the shade and shelter you provide for us and for many creatures. May its trunk remind us of your strength. May its lights bring us peace. May we remember your gift to us this season, the gift of the baby Jesus. Amen."

This tradition allows families to infuse a moment of spirituality into the tradition of decorating the tree, and might just allow for a "thin space" moment where the divine realm breaks into our earthly one. I pray that this Christmas season will bring many blessings to your family.



DEACON MINUTES

In December, we focus on the story of the nativity, the birth of Christ Jesus, the Son of God, who became a human being with fleshly body, while remaining God. As we think about the story I want to focus on the angels in the story.

The word angel derives from the Greek *angelos*, meaning messenger. The word suggests goodness and is often used to refer to someone who offers comfort and aid to others in times of trouble.

In the book of Luke, we read the angel, Gabriel, appears to Mary, a virgin who is pledged to marry a man named Joseph. He announces that she is to give birth to a son and name him Jesus. At first Mary is troubled by the news but verse 30 says, "But the angel says to her, 'Do not be afraid, Mary, you have found favor with God." Mary listens to the angel and then responds that she is the Lord's servant, believes that God is with her, and sings praises to God.

We also know that when Joseph, who was pledged to marry Mary, learned that she was pregnant, had decided to quietly divorce her. But again, God sent an angel to speak to Joseph. Matthew 1:20 tells us "But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit.'"

And one other time during the nativity story God sends angels to announce his son's birth. Luke 2 gives the account of an angel appearing to the shepherds, announcing the birth of Christ, the Lord. And then a multitude of angels appeared and said, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth, peace to men on whom his favor rests." (Luke 2:14 NIV)

I love how God used angels as messengers to Mary, Joseph, and the shepherds. Their focus was on relaying God's word and praising Him. We should learn a lesson from the angels. Although we are not spiritual beings, we can be God's messengers. In fact, we are instructed to go forth and spread the Good News. During this wonderful Christmas season look for ways that you can spread the Good News to others. Make time to study God's word and spend time praising Him for all your blessings. Help those around you. Give to those who are in need. Be compassionate to those around you. Share God's love. Have a blessed and joyful Christmas.
