One of questions our boys have started asking about everything is "Why?" Why do we go to bed at 7:30pm? Why is it bad if we're late? Why do we need sleep?

As laborious as it is answering all their questions, I realize they're learning. They're trying to understand the world. And asking "Why?" is a great way to do that.

In fact, we probably would all benefit from asking that question from time to time. I was reminded that when meeting with some pastor friends from other churches recently. The conversation turned serious, and one of them asked, "Why is we do what we do every Sunday?" And the answer, essentially, was Easter.

Because of Easter, we know that God is victorious over sin and death and everything that entangles us. Christ has defeated death, risen victoriously, and promises his children eternal life. Sin, shame, addiction, heartache, uncertainty — none of these have to define our earthly existence anymore. Because of Easter, we know that God breaks the yokes that bind us.

And on top of that, it was Easter that birthed the church. Christ's disciples were filled with awe and wonder at Christ's resurrection, and when Jesus sent them out to proclaim his victory, they told everybody. That's how the church

was formed. And on Easter Sunday, we're reminded that we're sent out to proclaim Christ's victory as well.

It's fitting then, that we celebrate Easter with worship and hope. And this year, Goochland Baptist has several ways to help you do that. On Thursday, April 6 at 7:00 pm in the MPR, we'll have a Maundy Thursday service to help us relive Jesus' last hours before his crucifixion. The service will center on a drama depicting Jesus' Last Supper with his disciples. At the end of the service, we'll take the Lord's Supper ourselves.

On Easter Sunday, we'll celebrate Christ's resurrection through worship in the sanctuary at 9:30 am. Following the service, we'll have an Easter Egg hunt for children, photo booths for individuals and families, and a time of coffee and fellowship. Sunday School will follow at 10:45 am.

Our hope this Easter is that you'll begin to ask the question, "Why?" as well. Why are you here? Why might God have made you? Why do you follow Jesus? Because so much of our lives are lived going through the motions, sometimes we don't often ask these important questions. Answering those questions clarifies a lot in our lives. As you do, I hope, you'll discover the central role Easter plays for all of us.

The countdown began around the first of the year. We printed out a special calendar and started marking off the days as they passed. Saturday, March 11 was the big day. This being Aubrey's Kindergarten year, she'd have her very own "spring break" to look forward to, and we'd booked a trip to Key Largo to visit my grandmother.

Mid-February came and brought a bout of the flu in our house. "Good," we thought. Now that's out of the way and we'll be nice and healthy when it comes time to fly down to Florida. The second week of March came and we had less than a week. The calendar was full of "X's" and Aubrey couldn't help but start packing days ahead of time. I had a bit of a sniffle so I decided to take a Covid test to be on the safe side.

Positive. The next morning Nicole took a test and it came up positive as well.

We began making the necessary cancellations. What would be a minor inconvenience to us would be a life-altering, devastating event to a kid who's not even six years old. Wouldn't it?

"God, thank you for this day, and all my blessings..." begins our short nightly prayer with Aubrey. Often times with a rote prayer it's easy to say the words and not necessarily be "all-in" on it every time. Even the Lord's Prayer is so familiar it's easy to zone out...and so it can be with our bedtime prayer. Let me tell you why that's been impossible these last couple weeks.

When we told Aubrey about her trip being cancelled, you'd have thought we were talking to a grown woman – and a mature, centered grown woman at that.

"Thank you for my family and friends. Please keep them safe, happy, and healthy..." the prayer continues. We prayed for our health - largely at Aubrey's request- and for the health of my grandmother down in Florida. Aubrey easily understood how three intruders from Virginia could infect an octogenarian woman and her friends living in an old-folks community in Key Largo.

Nicole and I went downhill pretty quickly and were essentially bed- and couch-ridden for two days. Aubrey was our butler and stand-up comedian. Not a word of complaint or whining or bitterness came out of her. There was a sweetness and compassion you just don't see out of kids her age. I swear I watched her grow up before my eyes. Bittersweet, you might say, but that was one of the greatest weeks I've had with my daughter.

We talk about unanswered prayers and blessings in disguise all the time, but getting to live that out gives the sayings meaning. We might not have taken the Covid tests and gone on down anyway, only to get noticeably sick after we'd hugged and kissed my grandmother.

And I never would have gotten to witness the continued miracle that is Aubrey Hope Lingerfelt in action.

"We pray in Jesus' name, Amen."


April 5th Giving Back to Our Community We'll be stuffing Easter Eggs for GBC's annual Easter Egg hunt for community families.
