There have been a lot of changes in our community in the six years I've served at Goochland Baptist Church. A couple more stops lights on Broad Street Road, old homes being torn down for new developments, and new houses popping up everywhere. When I ate lunch with some of our church members today, someone mentioned new shopping centers that were being planned at the corner of Manakin and Broad Street Roads.

I'm not a big fan of changes - Erin can tell you about that. But I've also discovered that change can be an opportunity for new growth. In fact, it's often the folks who dig their heels in and resist change that get left behind. Remember Blockbuster Video? They insisted that movies were meant to be watched on DVD...and they went bankrupt. Or remember Kodak Eastman? They were the one company synonymous with photography for decades. Yet in recent years, they insisted that pictures were meant to be printed, not to be viewed on screens. They, too, went bankrupt. Do you see a pattern here? Those who resist change are often left behind. The same could be said for churches. As our community and culture changes, our church should be willing to change, too.

One change I'm excited about is that we're bringing Vacation Bible School back this summer...but it will look different. Instead of the Monday-Friday morning model that we've used for decades, we're going to try an experiment: we'll have VBS on Wednesday nights for five consecutive Wednesday nights. And instead of just targeting children, we're going to target families. We'll have dinner and VBS-style programming for children and youth, and we'll also have activities for adults to participate in. Pastor Sharon and Heather Waldrop have done a lot of planning for this. I hope you'll read more about in on page 2 in Pastor Sharon's article.

This isn't the first change we've made: this past February, we pivoted from our traditional Wednesday night programming to a more outward-looking Wednesday night called Community Table. We've been really encouraged by it: new people have come, our Wednesday afternoon Bible study has grown, and connections between our church and community have been strengthened.

There are undoubtedly more changes that God will lead us to in the days ahead. But our pursuit of Jesus Christ is one thing that will never change. We will continue to celebrate his work in each of our lives. And with that, we're holding onto two traditions that will not change: Child Dedication Sunday and Senior Recognition. This Mother's Day, May 14, we'll be dedicating children to the Lord. And in June, we want to highlight our high school and college graduates to

"Make it a feature."

It was late 2020, and I was standing by Tony, my now-husband's, workbench, sobbing. I was deep into the process of making the box that would hold my grandfather's ashes, and I had made yet another mistake. I wanted the box to be worthy of Granddaddy Bob, complete with the same kind of artistry and care I watched him put into his own creations. Unfortunately, I was a brand-new woodworker, and the box was turning out far from perfect.

"What do you mean?" I asked, as I wiped my eyes.

"At work, we have a saying for when computer code doesn't work exactly how we hoped it would: 'Don't think of the imperfection as a bug. Make it a feature instead," Tony replied.

Make it a feature. In other words, take the mistake, the imperfection, and turn it into something useful. I will admit, the thought hadn't occurred to me. I was so focused on making the perfect piece to honor my grandfather that anything less than that seemed unacceptable.

How many of us struggle with perfectionism? How many of us are so paralyzed by the need to do something right that we find ourselves unable to do anything at all? I'm sure I'm not the only one who has struggled with these feelings. In fact, the Bible is full of people who didn't feel worthy to answer God's call because they feared they couldn't answer it perfectly. Moses, Jonah, Zachariah, Peter, and countless others all responded with shock when God called them. They didn't feel strong enough, smart enough, or good enough to be used by God. But He knew they were. Where they looked at themselves and saw bugs and problems to be corrected, God saw features that could be used to do His work.

2 Corinthians 12:9-10 reminds us that Christ says, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." We don't have to be perfect to do something meaningful in the world. We can't be. But God can redeem our imperfections and even turn them into something beautiful. We just have to be willing to see them that way, too.

In the end, I finished the box. It wasn't perfect, but I realized that it never needed to be. My grandfather loved me, and that love would have made him proud of me no matter how the box turned out. So it is with God, too. His love means that we don't have to be perfect—we just have to try, and trust that He will take care of transforming our bugs into features.
