My father-in-law gave me Alex Kershaw's book The Bedford Boys to read. I was so enthralled; I had a hard time putting it down. It tells the story that many of you already know - how an entire generation of young men in Bedford, VA made great sacrifices to serve our country in World War II. Many of you have been to the D-Day Memorial in Bedford, Virginia! For me, though, reading their stories and learning how their sacrifice affected an entire community gave me a renewed appreciation for the freedom that our country experiences. That's something that I'll celebrate this July 4. I hope that one day our entire world will be able experience that freedom.

But as we've all observed, freedom alone doesn't guarantee a meaningful life. You and I both know plenty of people in our midst who, although they're free, are miserable. Despite our freedom, many in our country are enslaved: enslaved to habits, addictions, and choices that keep bringing their lives down. They have the freedom to vote, to make their own choices, and to a large extent, determine our own destiny. But this political freedom alone doesn't save us.

Paul writes in Galatians 5, "It is for freedom that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by a yoke of slavery." Even if we live in freedom, we can still find ourselves enslaved, Paul suggests: slaves to sin, to shame, to worldly desires. But according to Paul, true freedom comes from Christ and choosing to follow him. Or as Paul

says, by "walking in the Spirit." We walk in the Spirit when choose to listen to God's Holy Spirit, which brings love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. When we follow this Spirit's leading in our lives, we experience the fruits of the Spirit. And that's when we experience true freedom in this world.

And that's the church's mission: to live in Christ's freedom ourselves and to point others to it.

We'll be exploring the freedom that Christ offers on Wednesday nights this month during Vacation Bible School. As you've heard, we'll be offering VBS on Wednesday nights starting July 12. Though the Wednesday night format is different, we'll be offering our children the same Bible stories, games, and crafts that we've always offered. I'm so grateful for the leadership of Heather Stewart and Pastor Sharon - and for so many of you who have signed up to help. Please invite your neighbors and bring your kids and grandkids! New this year is VBS programming for youth and adults, too. This will truly be a family event. Register at www.goochlandchurch.org.

There's a lot we have to be grateful for as we celebrate our country's freedom this month. But let's not forget that freedom in Christ is what truly sets us free. Paul's encouragement to the Galatians is good encouragement for us: Since we live by the Spirit, let us keep in step with the Spirit. (Gal 5:25) It's by living in step with the Spirit that we find true freedom.

It shakes us up, generates fresh thoughts and ideas. It encourages us to look at situations from a different perspective. We imagine a new "what if" that lies beyond our fears and worries... what if this is amazing!

This is the soundtrack of my thoughts as GBC prepares for it's first weekly, night-time VBS which begins July 12th. As Heather Stewart and I are coordinating this first-time effort, our hopes and prayers are for an amazing experience. We have already seen God at work in the response of the congregation to our call for volunteers. In addition to our GBC children, we have children registered from the community. We have adults registered to share in an evening meal, a time of study, and a time of mission activity. We ask that you continue to pray for the VBS program-that seeds of faith will be planted and hearts transformed.

Having VBS in the evening is different for GBC, but as I envision it, I ponder these new what-ifs:

- What if some of these children have never attended VBS because their parent's work schedule could not accommodate a daytime VBS?
- What if studying the same stories during their Bible study time, parents and children leave the church having discussions about what they have learned?
- What if those who were able for the first-time to volunteer for VBS (because it did not conflict with a work schedule) discover a God-given passion and purpose through their time at VBS?

There are so many what-ifs that could be asked! But I will finish with this one — What if we surrender it all to God, with the full expectation that God will use our VBS to transform lives in ways that we cannot even begin to imagine!

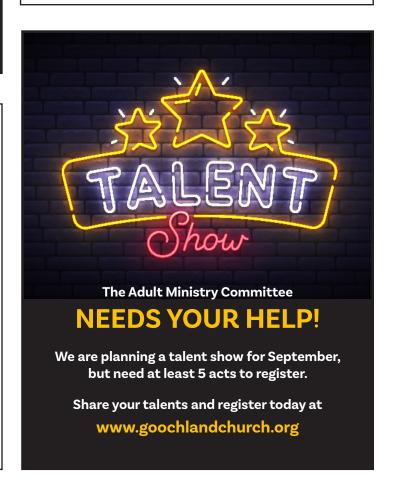
